THE GAME OF BOWLS – ANCIENT BEGINNINGS (PART 1)

The game at Jamberoo has been going for 56 years. Lawn Bowls origins can be traced back 7000 years to the ancient Egyptians. Biased stone balls have been found in archaeological digs. The Romans had a version that was to become the modern day Bocce. The Romans brought the game to other places in Europe. Several countries adapted the rules to suit themselves and the conditions of the day. Boules in France and Lawn Bowls in Great Britain.

Lawn Bowls was played in England in the 12th Century. In 1555 Queen Mary banned bowls completely for the underclass. COACHING CORNER

FOCUS ON THE PROCESS, NOT THE OUTCOME.

The leading practicing sports psychologists rank this strategy highly.

This concept is best explained by the Chinese proverb "Focus on the process, not the prize. When the archer shoots for nothing he has all the skill, when he shoots for a brass buckle he is already nervous. When he shoots for a prize of gold he goes blind or sees two targets. He is out of his mind, his skills have not changed but the prize divides him, he thinks more of winning than shooting and the focus on the prize drains him of his power.

When we talk about process versus outcome, how is it applicable to lawn bowling?

When you move to the mat there is a **downside** to thinking about the end score or the overall match score; that if you had not dropped shots or you had trailed the jack, your team would be well ahead on the board. All the focus should be on the next shot to be played. Listen to the skip, go through your usual routine and execute the shot.

In close contests, the self talk and team talk is not "We are going to win this game" it is, "I am going to keep my concentration and focus on my next shot.

Do this and the result will look after itself.
