## The Laws of the Sport of Bowls

## Agree the outcome of the End

There has been some chat recently about what happens if bowls are 'kicked back' before the number of shots are agreed. Please remember, that the two skips / vice must agree before any bowls are moved.
If the bowls are moved before the number of shots are agreed, then Law 37.1.5 applies.

### 37.1.5 Displacement of a bowl at rest.

37.1.5.1 If a bowl at rest or a toucher in the ditch is displaced by a player and it has not disturbed the head after it is displaced, the opponent must put the bowl back to its former position.
37.1.5.2 If a bowl at rest or a toucher in the ditch is displaced by a player and it has disturbed the head after it is displaced, the opponent must put the bowl back to its former position and replace any part of the head disturbed after the displacement.

## Eights Shot Penalty

Sometimes, you will hear people say that this misdemeanour on the green, or the other, is an 8 shot penalty. Sorry folks, there is NO provision for an 8 shot penalty for any discretion within the laws of the game. However, there is provision for instantaneous penalties under the Bowls NSW General Conditions of Play. These include:
General COP Section 35 - In the first instance, the opponent of the offender shall be awarded as many shots as there are bowls in use by the Opponent in singles or opposing Team in a team game or team in a side game.

## CLUB HISTORY (CONTINUED)

John Murphy was the first Club Secretary. Being a foundation member, it could be said that he layed the foundation for the club to foster. He oversaw two extensions to the club, construction of the No 2 green and lighting. John left the club in 1960.
George Chapman become the club's first Secretary Manager in 1960 and served for two years before taking a position at a larger club. In 1962, Lindsay Zbierski took over as Secretary Manager and he remained for six year.
Reg Duncan took up duties as Secretary Manager in December 1968. More on the Duncan Family influence in the next volume.
Hilton Alexander succeeded Jack Dennerley as Club President in 1969. Hilton was a founding member, had served as Vice President for three years, and was a delegate to the South Coast District for a number of years. During his tenure, the land which is now the front carpark for the club was acquired. This parcel of land can be seen in the photograph below between the red roofed house on the right, which is the current butcher shop, and the red roofed building in the centre of the photo, which is now the club's units.


In 1969 June Rutledge also succeeded Jean Fredericks as ladies president. Jean had served as Ladies President since 1964 and had overseen a period where the catering at the club was undertaken by the women. The Sunday roast being a particular

## 2023 Winter Challenge－Conditions of Play

－Open to all Club Jamberoo Members．

－Challenges are to be written on the sheet，no verbal agreements．Call the club if you cannot attend．
－Each Team should play one match per round．
－A Team may accept two or more challenges per round．
－Matches in a round can be played anytime between Wednesday morning and Monday Night．
－When teams win a match against a team above them－they switch places on the ladder．
－If a Team is challenged and cannot play during the round，they automatically move to the lower position．
－If scores are tied，Golden Point rule（one bowl each nearest the pin）．
－Teams in positions 24 to 17 may only challenge teams up to position 9.
－Round 1 commences Wed 05 July．
－Teams joining after Round 1 start at the bottom of the table．
－The finish date will be Monday 28 Aug．
－Challengers to pay $\$ 10$ per team，per round into the prize pool．
－Selectors will choose starting position on the table．
－Monthly Prizes for leader and biggest improvement．
－Prizes for competition Winner \＆Runner up．
－Handicaps and rules are subject to adjustment by the Bowls Committee．
