The Laws of the Sport of Bowls

Did you know?

Law 9.5 If, before a bowl has been played by each team or Singles player, a player notices that the wrong team or Singles player has delivered the jack, the correct team or Singles player will re-start the end.

Law 9.6 If, after a bowl has been played by each team or Singles player, a player notices that the wrong team or Singles player has delivered the jack, play in that end must continue in that order.

Law 9.7 After the first player to play has delivered the first bowl, no-one has the right to challenge the legality of the original position of the jack.

COACHING CORNER

ADAPTING TO THE CONDITIONS--- (FAST/SLOW/WINDY/WET)

- Becoming proficient in perfect conditions is not enough. You need to be conscious of the elements and the speed of the green.
- Remain positive, remember the conditions are the same for both teams. Poor conditions demand different skills and strategies from the bowler.
- Use positive self talk, "I can play well in slow/fast/windy/wet conditions/ Be guided by your skip.
- Keep the following suggestions in mind.

SLOW GREENS

- Stay down longer during your delivery to apply more force to the bowl.
- Use a firm grip, place the bowl further back in the hand.
- Aim to draw 1-2 metres past jack high.
- Start with a more upright stance to enable a longer, stronger delivery.
- A strong smooth delivery without bouncing or hurling gives far more consistency.

FAST GREENS



- Less energy and less speed of delivery is required.
- Hold the bowl with the fingers.
- Adopt a lower crouch position in your stance.
- Take your time on the mat, be more deliberate.
- Less backswing, less pendulum swing.
- Taken a smaller, slower step on release.
- Try drawing to 1 metre in front of the jack.

WINDY CONDITIONS.

- Wind will always be there. It can be hot, cold, refreshing, invigorating, a pleasure, a nuisance, an assistance or almost anything we want or don't want. In lawn bowls it can make an absolute fool of you if you try to fight or anticipate it or even ignore it completely.
- If wind is blowing across the rink steadily and without much gust then it is probable that you will play either side, and you should be confident by taking things evenly you will get the result you wish more often than not. You will just have to accept the fact that one side is wider or narrower than the other. Should the wind be extremely gusty, intermittent or unpredictable, then the wider hand will give you the best result. However the truest hand or side is always the best side to play.
- The windy or wider side will guarantee you one thing return of your bowl from a width towards the centre line, or assistance to the bias. On the contrary, the narrower side or side opposite the wind force, the leeward side, has very little or no guarantee of the bowl precessing naturally.
- 'Precessing' means the bowl is moved off its forward straight line by the action of 'torque', it means to gradually turn.
- Upwind (into the teeth of it) or downwind (behind you)? Initially the plan for you should be long downwind and short into the breeze. This is simply because it is easier. The control of length is reasonably predictable. However as the match progresses, then the reverse may be your option as it is more difficult and this may be what you require to gain a winning edge. Long upwind and short downwind will be a test of adaptability and patience as well as concentration.

Club History (continued)

By 1970, the club was well established. With two high quality greens, playing lights,

carparking at the front, and a large clubhouse with kitchen, it was seen as one of the premier bowling clubs on the south coast. But the improvements didn't stop there. Reg Duncan had taken over as Secretary-Manager in December 1968. He and new Club President Neil Parker proceeded to guide the club through a further extension in 1972. That extension came at a cost of \$104k, which is about \$800k in today's money, and included a three temprite system, cabinets to chill glasses, a 'Farmer's Bar' for those whose work commitments precluded conforming



to the dress regulations. The club now had space to host functions as well, which included the Annual Dinner which had previously been hosted Municipal Hall across the road.

Neil served as President for three years and his last official function was the 25th anniversary celebrations. This included a week of bowls with an official 'high tea' on the last day. The 25th Anniversary cake was baked by Neil's wife Ex and iced by the Ladies President Glad Tate. The cake was cut by Foundation President, Tim Jones.

Neil Parker's contribution to the club cannot be overstated being a Foundation Member, Treasurer from 1950 to 1968 (19 consecutive years) and President 1972 to 1974. As Treasurer, his vision saw the club facilities move from a one green operation with a NSW Railways tent for socialising, to tin shed, then a rudimentary clubhouse, onto two greens and modern facilities. Neil was awarded Life Members for his efforts.

Ron Tate followed Neil as President (continuing an unofficial tradition of husband and wife being President & Ladies President) and the club continued to grow its membership. At this time, there had been moves to divide the South Coast District and the club voted to approach the Illawarra District Bowling Association on 16 Sept 1976. This approach was accepted on 20 October 1976.


Jamberoo Bowing & Recreation Club Ltd

Billie Brown was a long term Jamberoo resident and a great bowler. Bill came to Australia from Scotland with his family in 1949. Growing up on the south coast and Victoria, the family finally settled in Dapto. Bill left school at 13 years of age to take on an apprenticeship as a panel beater. One new years eve, he met Narelle Jones at the

Headlands Hotel. Narell happened to be the daughter of Clyde (Tim) Jones, who was the first President of the Jamberoo Bowling Club.

(As an aside, Narelle remembers Tim had the shop directly opposite the club, which is now the Antique Shop. They used to sell vegetables and bake bread on the premises. Narelle would take fresh chicken over to the club when they closed on Saturday, which was the bowls prize for the day.)

Bill and Narelle married in 1963 and subsequently settled in Jamberoo.



Bill being an avid sportsman playing Rugby League for

Dapto in his early years, and later golf, being one of the original members of the Jamberoo Golf Club. In the 1990s, both Narell and Bill took up bowls.

Bill's friendly demeanour endeared him to all that bowled with him. He was an enthusiastic Pennants player who was also a member of the Jamberoo 2018 State Grade 7 winning team.



Edith May Harris was a long-term club stalwart and Life Member. Edie, as she was affectionately known, grew up in Bankstown and spent her holidays at Curramore. This is potentially when she met her future husband Noel Harris (pictured with Edie left). They were married in 1952 and both became very active bowlers. They had five children, Kevin, Des, Garry, Graeme, and Craig.

Records show that Edie won women's singles championship, mixed pairs, various pairs/

triples/ fours and was the Ladies Bowls Selector / Organiser for a number of years. She also enjoyed a game of darts with Noel during interclub competitions and was
